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WELCOME

LETTER FROM PUBLISHER

Dear readers,

We witnessed such inspiring social movement organizing in 2019. Building on the mass movements of the past decade: the Canadian Maple Spring; the anti-war movement which emerged out of 9/11; Idle No More; Occupy; Black Lives Matter; #MeToo; the Climate Strike, led by youth organizers, together with the leadership of Indigenous land defenders; the vision for a Green New Deal, and the powerful response of labour — teachers in particular in Ontario who are fighting for their rights and for the future generation — were cause for inspiration as 2019 came to a close.

The 2019 federal election coverage was some of our most successful yet, featuring voices and opinions from across the country. The election brought a Liberal minority government; saw the NDP reduced to fourth-party status; growth for the Green party, as it seeks a new leader; and a resurgence for the Bloc Québécois while the Conservative party stumbles ahead. On the ground there is still much fire to be fed: growing the diverse networks of grassroots resistance across the country, holding the government to account, and standing up against hate, oppression and climate denial. The sweep of Conservative governments across the provinces leaves only British Columbia with an NDP minority government, and finds Canada with no female premiers. Labour, across the country, is caught up in bitter struggles against austerity policies, and workers increasingly find themselves falling through the cracks in the growing gig economy.

Although it's easy to fall victim to nihilism in times of such extreme polarization, growing inequality and climate grief, platforms like *rabble.ca* were designed to hold space for your voices and your stories, and to be an independent watchdog. We were made for times like these.

As we put together this annual report, we are in the midst of a global pandemic, COVID-19; something unexpected (despite predictions), life-altering and far reaching. Our economy is reeling as millions of people in Canada are suddenly without work — or are experiencing fundamentally different work places and environments. Our health-care system is stretched, and vulnerable populations are even more vulnerable. *rabble.ca* has pivoted its plans for 2020 to focus on the response to COVID-19 pandemic: informing, analyzing, bringing people together in new ways of expressing solidarity, and seeking new ways forward that are more just, reduce inequality, and recognize the need to address the climate crisis with drastic and tangible solutions. Like you, we are in it for the long haul.

As not only independent, but non-profit media, *rabble.ca* continues to evolve and renew our place in the Canadian media landscape. We don't see our work as insular or removed from our readers, but instead see ourselves as an extension and amplification of the work of social movements and front-line activists, from coast to coast. We survive — and thrive — because of the work of our mobilized readers across the country. And as we enter our 20th year (can you believe it?), we are very excited about what we have ahead.

We remain committed to action. Over the past year Olivia Robinson joined as the 2019 Jack Layton Journalism for Change fellow. Her series focused on the critical role of public libraries in addressing inequality. We hired our sixth annual labour beat reporting intern, Zaid Noorsumar, who developed beats that focused on the gig economy, and the crisis in the long-term care sector. We began a new monthly politics webinar for members, with our award-winning parliamentary reporter Karl Nerenberg and regular panelists, providing insightful analysis and an opportunity for readers to share their thoughts and questions.

rabble.ca's brilliant writers and multimedia contributors bring powerful and innovative voices to the site. rabble.ca exists because of people — writers, video and podcast contributors, videographers, donors, readers and workers — who share a vision of what an independent media can and should be, and what the future is for media democracy in Canada. Our staff work daily to bring the best in progressive coverage to Canada. We had some farewells and "goodbyes for now" this past year: our managing editor Michelle Gregus moved on to write a new chapter in her life, after 13 years with rabble.ca. Michelle joined rabble.ca as a babble intern in 2006 — and continued on to lead the organization's editorial. We wish her the best and thank her for her incredible contributions to the rabble media project. We were grateful to welcome Matthew DiMera, who brings a breadth of knowledge to the role of acting editorin-chief, following Brenda O'Farrell's leave in early 2019. And we were delighted to welcome Alex Cosh, who has taken on the new role of opinions editor.



We were delighted to be nominated in several categories in the Canadian Online Publishing Awards again in 2019, and with Iller Campbell's Pro Bono column winning Gold in the Best Blog/Column Category — beating out the *Huffington Post* and *Policy Options* in this category. Congratulations to Pro Bono columnist Celia Chandler of Iler Campbell who won gold <u>for her series reflecting on medically assisted death in Canada</u>.



A special acknowledgement and thank you goes to all those who worked behind the scenes to bring you rabble over the past year: Maya Bhullar, Tania Ehret, Michelle Gregus, Brenda O'Farrell, Matthew DiMera, Victoria Fenner, Meg Borthwick, Derek Laventure, Christina Turner, Shirley Marquez, Sophia Reuss, and the teams at Consensus and Star Company all bring experience, professionalism and a tireless commitment to independent media.

Also, a thank you to our Members' Council executive of the past year — Matthew Adams, Bob Gallagher, Robert Lamoureux, Nicole Johnson, and Phillip Dwight Morgan — all of whom volunteer their time. Thanks also go to our Members' Council, representing our partner organizations and community members across Canada.

rabble.ca continues to grow and push the boundaries of online media. We have evolved as the internet has evolved. As we move into our 20th year, we have extraordinary memories and successes to look back on, as well as exciting times ahead. In this time of transition, we are grateful and honoured to have you, all of our readers and financial supporters. You prove time and time again, with your support, that independent and reader-funded media is a sustainable model.

I sign off at a time of great uncertainty. None of us know what the next month, let alone the next year will bring. Our commitment to improving media democracy continues. We wish all of you safety, security and good health as we, together, meet the challenges ahead.

WHAT'S AT STAKE

In 2019, news and columns were managed by the steady eye and political acuity of incoming editor-in-chief Matthew DiMera and managing editor Michelle Gregus, together with evening and weekend editors, Sophia Reuss and Christina Turner.

2019 was an election year and **What's At Stake** was the core theme that drove all of coverage. There was so much at stake: the youth and Indigenous-led climate activism and school climate strikes drove home the message that this election was about securing a future on this planet. The demands for a **Green New Deal** brought many labour and social justice activists together to demand climate justice and fundamental changes to our economy.

All contributors (columnists, bloggers and feature writers alike) were focused on the 43rd federal election. Writers covered the campaign trail from coast to coast, taking on **candidate platforms**, **election predictions** (some of which came true), and key **issues** not covered elsewhere, such as how a weakened Liberal government roiled by the SNC-Lavalin scandal formed a minority government. rabble.ca's contributors have taken on the task of understanding what that means for addressing the opportunities and challenges for moving Canada forward on progressive issues, including a morning-after-the-election discussion which we hosted online, featuring parliamentary reporter Karl Nerenberg, former NDP deputy leader and author of Outside In: a political memoir, Libby Davies, Leah Gazan, MP for Winnipeg Centre, and CCPA senior economist David Macdonald.

We strive to embolden the issues and views not covered in dominant media conversations, and our election coverage is no exception! From how ending poverty in Canada is far more than an election point, to the Indigenous struggles all but missing from much of the campaign trails, how the biggest winner in the 2019 election is the military, and the need to balance reproductive justice with climate justice around 2019 party platforms.



And while the campaign trails were hot, our contributors set out to ensure all other issues and movements were being represented, including ongoing struggles against education cuts in Ontario led by teachers unions, how the global climate strike is just the beginning, and the SNC Lavalin affair and how feminism was reduced to rhetoric.

We welcomed Bill Blaikie, former MP and MLA, as a regular columnist. Blaikie writes on Canadian politics, political parties and Parliament. Former CBC-TV journalist and *Toronto Star* columnist Antonia Zerbisias, also began her new exclusive column Broadsides about society, media and politics. We also welcomed professor emeritus at Simon Fraser University, and co-author of *Journalism and Climate Crisis: Public Engagement, Media Alternatives*, Robert Hackett, and his new blog, Greening the News.

JOURNALISM FOR CHANGE FELLOWSHIP


The Jack Layton Journalism for Change Fellowship was created in 2017, in honour of the memory of Jack Layton. In 2011, Canada lost a great social justice leader. Jack Layton inspired people by example, demonstrating that working together for social and economic justice is possible and achievable. The fellowship supports emerging writers and journalists who are passionate and engaged in developing unique voices in social change reporting. The fellowship is a one-of-a-kind opportunity for strengthening media democracy in Canada, while affording excellent mentorship and growth for new voices in our community.

rabble.ca's first fellow was Phillip Dwight Morgan, a Toronto-based journalist, poet and researcher. During his time at rabble Phillip was instrumental in getting to the heart of issues, in particular, systemic racial and economic inequality. Phillip has since joined the rabble.ca executive board.

Olivia Robinson was the fellowship recipient in 2019, <u>writing a series</u> on the importance of public libraries in furthering social justice. The series documented how libraries across Canada are re-imagining these public spaces and contributing in new and innovative ways to improve the social fabric of their communities. It explored these themes, and documented how, despite cuts in funding, libraries continue to make efforts in removing barriers and advancing inclusion, including striving for reconciliation and decolonization. In addition, the series looked at how libraries are bridging social service gaps and providing space for marginalized and vulnerable patrons.

PARLIAMENTARY REPORTER

2019 was a federal election year, and so a critical time for parliamentary reporter Karl Nerenberg, our award-winning journalist covering the federal politics beat. Karl's stories tell the under-reported news from the Hill. "News for the rest of us," if you will. Week in and week out, Karl delivers exclusive reporting from the Hill, and it's readers just like you who keep him there.

Parliamentary political reporting needs to go beyond the speculation of who is up in the polls and who is down. rabble.ca strives to provide analysis beyond the headlines. Good parliamentary reporting requires a strong knowledge of the history and context of Canadian politics with a keen eye to what is behind the rhetoric.

Over the course of 2019, Karl's stories tackled an erratic time in Canadian politics. The year began with scandal — the SNC-Lavalin travesty that led to the resignation of two key cabinet members of the Liberal government: minister of health Jane Philpott, and minister of justice and attorney general, Jody Wilson-Raybould. The government was dogged by controversy, and ended with further scandal as the country learned of an RCMP memo that permitted the potential use of lethal force against members of the Wet'suwet'en First Nation in British Columbia, who had been holding blockades to stop construction of a gas pipeline through their unceded territory, as Karl summarizes in "This year started and ended with SNC Lavalin" here.

Karl Nerenberg was busy at work with 2019 election analysis and reporting including <u>a list of promises kept and promises broken by the Trudeau government</u>, Jagmeet Singh and his success in the federal election debates, and the opportunity brought forth by election results for the Trudeau government to work with the Greens and NDP on a progressive agenda.

In 2019 we introduced a new Inside <u>Ottawa webinar series</u> for supporters of rabble.ca's parliamentary coverage. The monthly discussion has featured special guests, included former NDP house leader and author of *Outside In: a political memoir*, Libby Davies, the CCPA's David Macdonald, and NDP MP for Winnipeg Centre, Leah Gazan.

LABOUR BEAT REPORTING

In the era of the gig economy, precarious work and further deregulation — and with antilabour and anti-union rhetoric on the rise — we know that Canada, more than ever, needs a reminder of the power of collective action and organizing: the labour movement. We are proud to be able to continually offer the paid labour beat internship at rabble (now for seven years running!).

It's hard-hitting, plain-language journalism that looks at the economy from a labour point of view — not one bought by the big banks and business.

Keep up with our labour coverage on our <u>labour</u> issue page where you can also find critical reading including highlights from our labour beat reporter. The labour beat reporter internship was created in 2012 by *rabble.ca* and is a partnership with Unifor, Canada's largest union in the private sector, with the goal of improving understanding of the labour movement across Canada and creating a bank of labour reporting expertise among emerging journalists.

Our 2019 labour beat reporter was Zaid Noorsumar and some of his highlights include reporting on precarious work and the gig economy, home care workers, migrant workers, and shared economy contractors, and many other issues not given attention by dominant media: **Temporary work in Toronto**, **Justice for Janitors**, **Home care policies for workers in Ontario**. His work on home-care policies in Ontario was a forecast for the many issues that have been emerging this year under the COVID-19 pandemic. A read through the series provides many policy recommendations and predictions now brought to attention across the country.



GRAB A CUP OF TEA AND RELAX IN OUR BOOK LOUNGE

Welcome to the Book Lounge, where the issues are hot but the takes are thoughtful!

Highlights in 2019 from rabble's Book Lounge include interviews with up-and-coming authors — including **Kai Cheng Thom** and **Zalika Reid-Benta** — and established progressive names such as **Linda McQuaig** on privatization, and **Martin Lukacs** on *The Trudeau Formula*.

We published reviews of Canadian and international books covering crucial topics from <u>climate change</u> to <u>the relentless creep of white supremacy</u> to <u>feminist urban planning</u> and how **#MeToo** has affected queer communities.

The book lounge also published several roundups: of books on work to read for <u>Labour</u> <u>Day</u>; of books to help you dive deeper into <u>election issues</u>; and of the books Canadian independent bookstores **wanted you to read in 2019**.



INDIGENOUS ISSUES - DECOLONIZING MEDIA

rabble has always turned first to Indigenous people on stories of social justice and the ongoing sagas of colonization and imperialism. Our mission is first and foremost to be active participants in decolonizing journalism. We strongly believe that communities most affected by issues of poverty, climate justice and oppression — of which Indigenous people are leading the struggles against — should be told by the communities themselves.

Some highlights in Indigenous stories from 2019 include:

The merging of gender and colonization: including how the the justice system fails to protect Indigenous women and girls, how Canada continues to to deny sex equality to Indigenous women and children, ending sex descrimination in the Indian Act and how Canada is guilty of genocide.

Climate issues: including how the Attawapiskat water crisis continues despite urgent calls from community, reports from World Water Day, and how renewable energy could be a force for decolonization.

The Activist Toolkit <u>shared resources</u> on how to help implement the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girl report findings, and rabble radio reports on the <u>Reconciliation</u> **Bookclub**.

#CLIMATE STRIKE & GREEN NEW DEAL - CLIMATE COVERAGE AT RABBLE.CA

rabble.ca believes the media needs to report on social movements and their various intersections. Nowhere is this intersection more evident than in the fight to reclaim our environment and coasts. We cover the connections between social and climate justice and Indigenous activism solidarity. And was 2019 the year of climate movements or what?

With climate strikes led by youth activists; the front lines on the call for cancellation of pipelines and the protection of the environment led by Indigenous communities and activists across the country; the world tour of Swedish climate activist Greta Thunberg, whose visit to Canada resulted in one of the largest demonstrations in the world happening in Montreal; and the rise of voices calling for a Green New Deal in Canada (inspired by the initiative of U.S. Representative Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez), there was a buzz of activism in the air.

Highlights of 2019 climate justice resistance, and in particular the climate strike, include: the importance of Indigenous voices and leadership at the climate strike, the massive response to Greta Thunberg's arrival to Canada, why we at rabble supported the climate strike, and our special features, speaking with climate strike organizers across the country.

We featured pieces on the <u>Green New Deal and migrant justice</u>, an exclusive interview with Naomi Klein, and a special guide to bringing a Green New Deal to your community.

We also livestreamed the Vancouver stop of the Leap's Green New Deal speaking tour, featuring David Suzuki and Avi Lewis. You can watch the **video online**.

YOU WON'T BELIEVE OUR SOCIALS

With over 27,000 Facebook (facebook.com/rabble.ca) fans and group members, and over 42,000 Twitter (twitter.com/rabbleca) followers, rabble has the potential to reach hundreds of thousands of Canadians with our content. Our Instagram (instagram.com/ rabbleca) is still growing, as our staff use it to reflect our on-the-ground outreach, posting from rallies and protests, and connecting with our community partners.

Our most shared piece on Twitter in 2019 was parliamentary reporter Karl Nerenberg's feature on a list of the Trudeau government's promises, both broken and kept: "<u>Trudeau Kept Some Important Promises But Broke Many Big Ones</u>." Labour beat reporter Zaid Noorsumar wrote about the personal support worker shortage in Ontario, and his piece garnered extensive traffic as well. "<u>Personal Support Worker Shortage Plaguing Ontario Nursing Homes</u>" was shared 1,650 times on Facebook alone in one day.

rabble continues to be one of the first places journalists, MPs and Canada's most influential political minds — conservative and progressive alike — turn for what left-wing, labour-conscious Canadians are thinking. (Even iPolitics named a column after us).

In an increasingly crowded news market, real clout in the social media sphere is absolutely essential.

We are fortunate to have the support of great community minds and influencers, artists, activists and commentators alike.

JOURNALISM ON THE STREETS

Since its very inception in 2001 in the streets of Quebec City, rabble has been putting its money where its mouth is. We pay special attention to grassroots protest and social movements in our journalism — often because we're already there.

Our outreach team, managed by operations coordinator Tania Ehret, is an indispensable component of our work, as we seek to organize critical workshops and panels, and ensure that Canada's best radical artists and storytellers find audiences for their work. We continue to emphasize the importance of solidarity among social movement organizations through partnerships, including as media sponsors in 2019 for the Vancouver International Film Festival, the Tommy Douglas Institute, Word on the Street Toronto, The Mayworks Festival of Working People and Arts, and the Canada-wide speaking tour of Robert Fisk, organized by Canadians for Justice and Peace in the Middle East. In addition, we helped to boost the scope of various book launch and speaking tours including: former NDP MP Libby Davies' book *Outside In: A Political Memoir*, Fred Wilson's *A New Kind of Union*, and Martin Lukacs' *The Trudeau Formula: Seduction and Betrayal in and Age of Discontent*. We frequently work with our friends at partner organizations to find new and innovative ways to collaborate.

We are always ready to pack up our event coverage gear or our tabling supplies and head out into the community. This past year, we set up interactive tables at the Tommy Douglas Institute event at George Brown College, and the National Campus and Community Radio Station conference. We provided exclusive materials for information sharing at both the CUPE and United Steelworkers conventions. In addition, our parliamentary reporter Karl Nerenberg has appeared on News 95.7 in Halifax with host Sheldon McLeod; president emeritus Duncan Cameron is a regular commentator on Radio Canada, and our operations coordinator Tania Ehret appeared with other media on a panel about progressive media organized by Socialist Studies at UBC during Congress 2019.

ACTIVIST TOOLKIT

Nowhere is our commitment to grassroots activism clearer than the Lynn Williams Activist Toolkit. Launched in 2013, and coordinated by Maya Bhullar since 2015, the toolkit is a space to amplify what organizers are doing, and share, discuss and create tools for organizing from the ground up. Lynn Williams was a labour organizer, activist and the first Canadian to become international president of the United Steelworkers. The toolkit reflects Williams' dedicated work as a lifelong activist, providing organizers and communities with access to success stories, guides, workshop outlines, petitions, open source software, copy-left images, activist histories and more.

In 2018, Doug Ford was elected in Ontario. The toolkit hosted the #OntarioFightBack series, which collected resources and amplified efforts to take a stand against the regressive policies and social cuts of the new provincial government in Ontario. Public education, health care and other public services are being targeted across the country. The toolkit initiated a project to find out what public sector union leaders across the country are doing to fight back and published interviews with Harvey Bischof, Michael Hurley and Jason
Schilling, the respective presidents of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, Ontario Council of Hospital Unions and the Alberta Teachers Association. We continue to amplify efforts to fight for public service through 2019 and into 2020.

The student climate strike movement is developing a wonderful new generation of activists. The Activist Toolkit reached out to climate strike organizers across Canada after national actions in the **spring** of 2019 and in the **fall** to support and amplify their work. We will continue to build our relationships.

The Activist Toolkit also shares tools that make us better activists. The new frontier for activism is online, and we are constantly struggling to make our time online more impactful. To this end, the Activist Toolkit put together ways to be **more effective on social media** and a **reading list of activist books**. We look forward to building the Activist Toolkit in 2020 to help spotlight more of the efforts of activists across Canada and to help us all have more of an impact.

Things have changed since we launched our first podcast, rabble radio, in 2005. This year, the rpn brought its in house podcasts rabble radio and Needs No Introduction up to a weekly rotation. Our podcasts are available through iTunes and many other podcast applications, so all you need to do is go to your smartphone, open your podcast app and search for *rabble.ca* so you can download our episodes!

Highlights from our own in-house podcasts in 2019 include: an interview with Janet Spring as she tells us that her son-in-law and political prisoner **Edwin Espinel** has been released from a Honduran prison pending trial; an on the ground interview with Carlos Torres by **Corvin Russell** from Chile in the midst of massive protests; and an election report from rabble.ca's parliamentary reporter **Karl Nerenberg** about what could happen if there was a minority government after the federal election (which there was). 



In 2019, our annual campaign launched in September and met its \$65,000 goal. We launched our winter fundraiser in December 2019, and were thankful to donors who helped us meet our \$50,000 goal early in 2020. With donations averaging \$5/ month, a total of \$122,000 was raised from individual donors — over \$88,000 of which came from our regular monthly donors.






FINANCIAL REFLECTIONS


A special thank you to our membership coordinator, Shirley Marquez, as well the good people at Star Company: Suzanne Robertson and Sarah Hopen, for their help with bookkeeping and our annual audit.

The total operating budget for *rabble.ca* in 2019 was \$352,354 — with nearly \$122,000 raised from individual donations. Our winter and fall fundraising campaigns surpassed fundraising goals. Thank you to our donors! We couldn't do it without you! Of course this is a fraction of what it costs to do journalism, and we thank all the volunteers who time and effort make independent media like *rabble.ca* possible.

We continued to raise funds for the Jack Layton Journalism for Change Fellowship each year, in partnership with the Institute for Change Leaders, and at the end of 2019 we learned that we were awarded a Canadian Periodical fund grant to help fund the implementation of a new CRM (customer relationship management) system to help rabble modernize its database and engagement tools. And thanks to Lush Charity Pot we were awarded a grant to assist us with our social media marketing and best practices.

rabble has a solid reputation of being an efficient and lean operation that punches far above its weight in terms of reach and in original content. In 2019, rabble again proved itself a sustainable organization, and saw the year end with a surplus, and plans for building the organization in new directions.






STATISTICS

MEASURING TRAFFIC

Withmore than 1.2 million users/unique visitors coming to the site in 2019, reading almost 3.3 million pages, rabble's traffic continues to grow. We saw an increase in new users to the site, with 88% of users being new, with a particular upswing during the fall election months.

Nearly half of those coming to the rabble site do so by means of a Google search. Of the remaining half, links from social media surpassed direct links, referrals, as well as our weekly and daily newsletter as the primary means of reaching the site.

A total of 74% of our readers in 2019 came from Canada, and 14% from the United States. rabble also maintains a presence on Flipboard and Google News. Google Analytics provides statistics for Flipboard, which had 44,131 users in 2019. Google Newsstand had just under 9,000 regular readers.





MEET THE RABBLE AUDIENCE

SURVEY RESULTS FROM RABBLE'S 2019 READERS' SURVEY

- rabble readers are between 25-74, hail from coast to coast and beyond, and are highly educated. The majority (48%) earn between \$20,000 to \$60,000 per year.
- 49% of our readers identify as male, 47% identify as female, and 4% identify as non-binary/two-spirited/ or genderqueer.
- 53% reported some form of employment, while 35% are retired.
- rabble readers care, with 93% donating to one or more community organizations every year, and 70% donating to three or more!
- rabble readers are also highly involved in their communities, with 70% participating in volunteer work each week, 43% belonging to a professional organization or association, 41% belonging to a grassroots organization, 37% belonging to an NGO, 30% belonging to a trade union, 21% belonging to a cooperative, and 18% belonging to a religious organization.
- rabble readers are both loyal and committed to rabble's various platforms: 67% read
 rabble on a desktop or laptop computer, and 89% of these readers also access our
