We made it. Lucky number thirteen.

2014 was *rabble.ca*'s thirteenth year reporting news for the rest of us. The same age as Wikipedia. Three years older than Facebook. So many other online media organizations have not been able to hang on. Yet we at *rabble.ca* have always been and continue to be non-profit, community supported and completely independent. We are grateful to all of our many supporters who keep us flourishing.

We continue to grow and push the boundaries of online media. We have 13,000 fans on Facebook and 30,000 followers on Twitter—10,000 more than last year. This year we had our first article reach more than one million readers. Astonishing for an organization whose total budget is close to Steve Paikin's annual salary.

Our reporting continues to distribute and amplify the messages of social and labour movements to ordinary Canadians. For the third consecutive year, in partnership with Unifor, we hosted a Labour Beat Reporter—a dying breed in Canada. Our news and features section produced several hard-hitting series on Canadian politics while our Lynn Williams Activist Toolkit continues to expand and educate the next generation of activists.

Once again we turned to the public and to our partners to support the work of our parliamentary reporter, Karl Nerenberg. And again, the public responded, showing their appreciation of his sweeping knowledge of Canadian political history and his critical work on the dangerous Fair Elections Act and his pre-vote primer on the 2015 Federal Election. Karl's popular posts dig into the laws, the schemes, and the politics of Parliament. His work is a "must read" for Canadian political news junkies.

Under the stewardship of our editorial team: Editor-in-Chief Meagan Perry, Managing Editor Michelle Gregus, Blogs Coordinator Michael Stewart, News & Books Editor Kaitlin McNabb, we welcomed new bloggers, columnists, book reviewers, contributing editors and beat editors. We produced a number of indispensable series: Donald Gutstein's "Follow the Money" investigated the major Canadian corporations who financially support Harper's Conservative government. Guest editor Nora Loreto launched UP! Canadian Labour Rising on the underreported yet vital workers movement in Canada.



has been launched by President Obama, the leader who had withdrawn American troops and proudly ended the war in Iraq."






Steelworkers welcome industrial inquiry in beer can strike

This is a rare specimen of the elusive paid internship, offered by rabble.ca and generously supported by the labour movement.




He almost didn't make a speech at all. On Thursday, Yussuff defeated incumbent President Ken Georgetti by just 40 votes, an indication of how tough an election it was. Almost 5,000 people came to vote, and the room was divided by pennants -- orange for Georgetti, blue for Yussuff.

Who visits rabble.ca? Our survey* says:

Fifty-two per cent of *rabble.ca*'s audience identified as men, 47 per cent as women.

Much of our audience is from Ontario, which represents more more than 40 per cent of the total. The next largest group came from British Columbia at more than 20 per cent of the total. About ten per cent of our audience is from the U.S.

rabble.ca readers are a highly educated group with over 80 percent reporting a post secondary school degree.

rabble.ca readers are highly involved with 70 percent 30 per cent doing volunteer work each week, 32 percent belonging to a trade union, 41 per cent belonging to a grassroots organization, 40 per cent to an NGO, 11 per cent to a religious organization.

This year, *rabble.ca* focused more closely on incorporating breaking news writing into the site, with the goal of making *rabble.ca* quicker to respond to current events without sacrificing our support of progressive causes and space for analysis. *rabble.ca*'s editorial team made a concerted effort to improve the diversity of viewpoints and writers we present on the site. We solicited pitches and writing from people of colour and women writers, we expanded our coverage and offered training and mentorship to new writers throughout the year, expanding our reach in the freelance community.

On the production side, *rabble.ca* also took the time to launch a number of series examining some of the elements our site has focused on for years. In UP! We invited guest editor Nora Loreto to work with writers from all levels of the Canadian labour movement, who considered the issues and debates within the house of labour. We created a series called Revolution 101 brining thoughtful analysis to the tools that we've collected at the Lynn Williams Activist Toolkit. Donald Gutstein's series on the influence big business on Canada's political system gained widespread attention. We commemorated the third anniversary of Occupy with a series examining what has grown out of the Occupy movement.

The slow pace of social change can be demoralizing for a progressive person. To give progressives a bit of inspiration, we added "Feel Good Friday" to the news section. The popular feature brings together victories progressives can celebrate together—with loads of cute cat photos too.



In some ways 2014 made it a little easier to be positive. It featured some significant gains for progressives, including a Supreme Court decision in favour of the Tsilhqot'tin First Nation, and the departure of Kinder Morgan Trans Mountain pipeline workers from Burnaby Mountain following weeks of protest.

2014 was also the year that systemic oppressions made the news. Not just the alternative media news, mind you, the mainstream news. Massive public reactions and subsequent mainstream media acknowledgement of systemic oppressions followed #BlackLivesMatter protests, and the revelations and allegations of sexual assault against CBC host Jian Ghomeshi. The reverberations of 2013's Idle No More urged more and louder calls for a national inquiry into murdered and missing Indigenous women. While it was significant that these issues got some widespread attention and analysis, systemic racism and sexism persist, and rabble.ca will continue to address these issues in the years to come.

The results of our work in 2014 have been clear and positive: our and grown our readership.


Simply put, the blogs section at rabble.ca is where the cool kids and their cool mentors hang out. It can be by turn humorous and irreverent, thoughtful and nuanced. Blogs are often where the grist of election cycles are turned into fine flour-as evidenced by Toby Sanger's exposé of Tim Hudak's catastrophic jobs plan that was thankfully never implemented. Likewise, Judy Rebick's optimistic yet ultimately unrealized reminder that "hope is better than fear" in her backing of Olivia Chow's Toronto mayoral campaign. Federal MPs Elizabeth May, Alexandre Boulerice and Charlie Angus as well as NDP pundit Gerry Caplan are also regulars on our blogroll.

This section is also uniquely equipped to respond quickly to breaking news—as we





They can also offer individualized, meditative contemplations on political and cultural topics. It's here where a blog offers its most powerful tonic to the bland stenography of power that is mainstream news. Veteran journalist and prolific blogger David Climenhaga does this day in and day out, but his caution and needful remedy to the canonization of the late Conservative Finance Minister Jim Flaherty seen in the corporate news was spectacular. We also see this expert analysis in Pamela Palmater's eviscerating and unrelenting takedown of Harper's racist, colonialist and just plain bad law, the so-called First Nations Financial Transparency Act.

As one of the most diverse spaces in Canadian media, the *rabble.ca* blog section is also a space where marginalized voices can speak their truth to power. New to us in 2014, Samantha Nock is a young Métis woman while veteran migrant activist Syed Hussan takes on Canada's xenophobic immigration system as his personal mission.

Finally, the architecture of the blogs section also allows for the quick organization and release of a special series—and 2014 witnessed two excellent specimens. Highlights of 2014's rabble book lounge reviews:

Canada's complicated relationship with prochoice politics by Michelle Reid

This year has been particularly not great for reproductive rights in Canada with the closing of the Morgentaler clinic serving as that symbol. This book and review act as a reminder of not only Canada's vocal anti-choice groups' terrible logic, but that pro-choice advocates need to listen and trust women too, regardless of circumstance.

'Gender Failure' defies gender rules, roles and assumptions By Mercedes Allen

Authors Ivan E. Coyote and Rae Spoon shared their experiences of failing to fit into the gender binary through personal essay, lyrics and drawings. Reviewer Mercedes Allen is tailor-made for this review, bringing their own experience and knowledge of navigating gender narratives, roles and assumptions to this review, creating a piece that makes us think. And think. And think...

Idle No More, Indigenous resistance and the larger movement by Lindsey Cornum

This compilation of essays from the Idle No More movement was stunning and a necessary contribution to the Canadian literary scene. Reviewer Lindsey Cornum brings a sharp analysis—what was the role of women in INM?; what is resistance?—to this complicated text that *rabble.ca* felt lucky to publish.

Harper's Canada: What have we become? By Amira Elghawaby

Maybe you've noticed this thing called 'Harperism' sweeping over Canada, slowly at first it seemed, and with more and more speed as the years followed. Well, the impeccable Donald Gutstein wrote a book about it and the Harper-loving think tanks that are informing Canadian politics. And it's downright terrifying.

Working it: Sex work as labour by Muna Mire

The sex work conversation is contentious – to say the least. The resistance against pipelines in Canada has been one of the bigger political actions in Canada this year with numerous communities from all across the country gathering together to say 'No!' to pipelines. This volume collects some of the most prominent voices from the movement to look at every facet of this issue.

'El Niño' draws attention to the issues of migrant labour by Christina Turner

Nadia Bozak's 'El Niño' was a great addition to Canadian literature this year, but also helped shed light on the ever-growing issues of temporary foreign workers in Canada and the U.S. Reviewer Christina Turner brought her passion for food politics, migrant worker issues – oh, and a couple advanced degrees in English – to this review to go beyond just a literary analysis.

Unions matter. So why does Canada pretend like they don't? by Nora Loreto

Why it's great: The blatant attack on unions this year by the Harper government is not surprising, but boy is it infuriating! Nora Loreto is well-versed in the politics of unions (and the backwards rhetoric of anti-union folks) and gave us the tools to fight neoliberalism, austerity and anti-union, right wing tripe.

'Crazy Town': Doolittle does a lot with Rob Ford's story By Heather Morgan

Why it's great: I think Heather Morgan could potentially rival Robyn Doolittle in her expertise and ability to write about Rob Ford. Seriously! This book came out, and all I thought was "Must. Send. To. Heather. Morgan. Now." And she did not disappoint. The ongoing saga of The Ford Family is... indescribably fascinating. Luckily, Morgan finds the words.

babble continues to be one of the most visited areas of *rabble.ca*. In 2014 federal election discussions really began to heat up. Threads on the NDP and Mulcair were especially busy. On the international front the Ukraine, Syria and Russia threads were numerous and very busy.

2014 was a year of change and a year of anticipated change. Looking to the 2015 federal election and the proliferation of election threads, a new forum was created to hold just Election 2015 discussions. The forum is a temporary one, which will be archived at an appropriate time post-election.

We've seen some improvement to our moderating tools; the user approval queue helps us weed out spammers more effectively and was put in place after a particularly nasty spam attack. Thank you to our tech support team for that.

2014 was a year on babble that very much foreshadowed the focus of discussions in Canadian politics in 2015, and with so many issues (the election, tar sands expansion, C-51, ongoing attacks on labour, food sovereignty etc.) 2015 is looking to be our most passionate and exciting year on babble yet.



Lynn Williams is a labour organizer, activist and the first president of the United Steelworkers.

The Toolkit reflects William's dedicated work as a life-long activist, providing organizers and communities with access to guides, workshop outlines, open source software, copy-left images, activist histories and more. The Toolkit's blog and podcast keep lived experiences at the forefront of these resources.

In 2014 the Lynn Williams Activist Toolkit continued to help connect activists to tools and sparkled under the irrepressible eye of Coordinator Steffanie Pinch. rabble.ca has grown significantly since the early days.


As demand increases for our content, the server architecture has matured. With the additional staff hours and hardware available to us, we've begun to shift from an under-resourced crisis management focus to one of refinement and planned improvements of the site.

We comfortably serve content to numbers well beyond what we were once able to without seeing much of a blip in the site performance. With our security focused back-end, our systems were safe this past year from a few major security issues that affected hundreds of thousands of sites world-wide. We continue to keep our systems updated and secure as a priority of our daily work.

The most exciting upgrade in 2014 was the significant improvements we made to our outdated podcast feed system. Now new podcasts are regularly setup to meet iTunes standards for inclusion, a huge boost to our reach and audience. A significant portion of tech work this year has gone towards our communication systems, both internal and external. We've migrated to a new version of our mailing service and engaged in trial projects with alternative and complimentary mailing services to find the right fit for *rabble.ca* in 2015 and beyond. We also completely migrated to a new ad management system.

We made a carefully considered choice to retire our internal commenting system and move to the popular third-party commenting system "Disqus." While not without its criticisms, we believe it to be the right choice at this time. Disqus reduces resources needed to keep *rabble.ca* secure and to combat spam, while opening our comments up to a wider community. The net result has brought in far more conversation to *rabble.ca*.

Since our last upgrade from Drupal 5 to 6, we've made many of our tech decisions with a best practice approach for future upgrade paths. We're very excited to be close to the next phase of major upgrades to Drupal 7, and bringing a smoother more responsive experience to our users in the coming year.




financial reflections


The total operating budget for rabble.ca in 2014 was \$386,322

rabble.ca's reliance on Sustaining Partners income was represented in 54 per cent of our total income. Monthly donor support accounted for 16 per cent of the annual budget, single donations were up to 20 per cent and advertising sales, services, in Cahoots and sponsorships together accounted for 8% of the total income in 2014.

74 per cent of *rabble.ca*'s expenses are staffing and contributor costs. Within that staffing and contributor expense, In the overall expenses, editorial accounts for 46% of rabble's expenditures, fundraising 14%, tech 16%, and promotion 5%. Administration costs include bookkeeping, accounting, legal, rent, banking fees, copying and postage, staff retreat and board meeting costs, etc.


Statistics

Measuring traffic


rabble.ca measures statistics using a variety of sources: site statistics are derived Google Analytics, AWStats and Chartbeat. rabble uses AWStats and Google Analytics to measure website traffic. While the programs measure different variables (log files vs. javascript), together they provide a helpful view of traffic trends. Both analytics programs continue to improve on the robustness of their measurements. Chartbeat measures real time traffic day to day.

We also track statistics for our presences on other sources, including Google Newstand, SoundCloud, YouTube, Livestream.com, Twitter and Facebook. rabble also offers a number of daily and weekly email products (a full list can be found at http://lists.rabble.ca) and measures statistics for emails using WhatCounts.


In 2014 rabble averaged 300,000 unique visits per month, and over one million page views per month. In addition, we had over 35,400 unique users on Google Newsstand. Our Facebook fan page grew to over 13,000 fans, and our very active Facebook group to over 5000. Twitter surpassed 30,000—a growth of 10,000 in one year.



The above graphic, drawn from AWStats, is an indication of the traffic trends over the seasons of 2014.



In 2014 rabble.ca had 5,758,932 unique sessions from 238 countries/territories. Sixty-two per cent of traffic to the site came from Canada, and 25% from the United States. Within Canada, traffic predominately coms from Ontario (47%), British Columbia (23%), and interestingly, for the first time in the third largest readership was from Alberta (10%).



The above graphic indicates the primary methods by which people came to *rabble.ca*. In a significant change from past years, over 45% of our traffic came from social searches.

rabble.ca operates with a dedicated crew of part-time and volunteer staff. Our work is supported by interns, volunteers and a volunteer board of directors.

In Vancouver, rabble.ca was a member of the HiVE Community space until we recently cohoused with our friends at the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives (CCPA) in Vancouver's historic Dominion Building. In Ottawa you can find us at 250neCommunity. Our Parliamentary Bureau in 2014 was located at 280 Albert Street in Ottawa.
