You know things are happening when a mainstream media organization like *Time Magazine* declares "The Protester" as the Person of the Year. At *rabble.ca* we have been covering democratic movements and struggles since day one over 10 years ago. As a media site, *rabble.ca* just isn't like the other guys. We tell the stories of activists, of social movements, of workers, of communities fighting for change. That's why we aren't surprised that we remain Canada's most popular national source of independent progressive news and views.

In April of 2011, rabble had its 10th anniversary and we celebrated by looking to the future by launching a special year-long series *Reinventing democracy: Reclaiming the commons*, a progressive dialogue on Canada's future. This series, curated by Murray Dobbin, posted 32 stories exploring a progressive future.

Coincidentally, not long after we launched the series, the amazing Occupy Wall Street phenomenon launched a world-wide protest focused on one of the most pernicious and most obvious effects of globalization: the almost unbelievable levels of inequality that the last 30 years of liberating the "market" has wrought. We are proud to report that *rabble.ca* was the first media in Canada to have a special <u>section dedicated to the #Occupy movement</u> bringing together all of our coverage plus links and feeds of coverage elsewhere. We continue to cover the #Occupy movement closely.

It was a federal election year in Canada in 2011 and the intense interest in our elections coverage led us to <u>create an "elections" page</u> on our site last year, including coverage of the seven provincial elections. We curated special blogs just for the elections and had coverage across the site. Interest was high, during the federal election an all time high of 350,000 unique visitors used our site.

In general, our audience grew, with rabble now getting over 2 million page views a month and averaging over 150,000 individuals visiting rabble every month. We also deliver the news through our e-newsletters (daily and weekly), our iPad app, Facebook presence and our popular tweets.

In 2011 there was also the passing of NDP leader Jack Layton. Like millions of Canadians, we mourned his loss and reflected on his life's work. We maintain a page dedicated to memories of Jack Layton's life.

Additionally, we took a leadership role in <u>following the NDP leadership</u> race with extensive news and analysis, including exclusive conversations with candidates on our discussion board babble.

News and Features Editor Cathryn Atkinson departed *rabble.ca* in 2011 in order to focus on her writing; something we are glad to report is that she will be doing writing on occasion for rabble. Thank you to Cathryn for all her great work curating "news for the rest of us." We will also miss Tor Sandberg who did great work with rabbletv (and remains as an advisor to rabble) who left to do communications work with a union. Last year also saw us welcome Elaine Bernard, Executive Director of the Labour and Worklife Program at Harvard University to our board and Fred Wilson, assistant to the President of the Communications, Energy and Paperworkers Union to our board.



rabble.ca's daily news and features scheduling in 2011 reflected what was going on in the world of progressive action and politics. It was a very busy, revolutionary year, full of major events. We were kept on our toes, doing our best to keep up in a changing progressive environment.

Firstly, it was *rabble.ca*'s 10th birthday. The early part of the year was, in part, a build up to celebrations in April. Written reflections and our history became part of our stories, not least because it made those of us who run *rabble.ca* mindful of our roles and responsibilities to the website, to our readers and to the voices and ideas that we promote.

There was continuous pressure through the year to publish an increasing number of stories on a wide variety of subjects, partly because of events in Canada and beyond, and partly to satisfy an astronomical increase in readership. Staff and volunteers worked extremely hard to accomplish this, and the successes were gratifying. Aboriginal rights, climate change and the environment as well as many other topics fought for prominence on the website.

A select monthly review of 2011's news and features:

January

At *rabble.ca*, we were already planning ahead for the election:

rabble.ca kicked off 2011 with this piece by Kathleen O'Hara, naming in detail the attacks Stephen Harper and his Conservative Party were making on the social fabric of Canada as a minority government, with the aim of giving a taste of what could happen if they were handed a majority.


In the summer of 2011, rabble decided that there needed to be a rabble reporter on Parliament Hill and appealed to rabble visitors and supporters:

"rabble.ca is ready to take on Parliament, getting the stories you won't get from conventional and corporate media, giving context to political moves, covering the political events that matter and making a difference in what Canadians know about what is really happening on the Hill.

We want to put a rabble reporter (and not just any reporter, see below) on Parliament Hill with access to the Press Gallery, the lobby, committees, politicians, political staff and spokespeople. We need 'just reporting,' not just reporting: now more than ever we need Parliamentary reporting for the rest of us."

rabble readers agreed and together with donations from CUPE, CEP and the CAW contributed more than \$10,000 over a short period to help fund the position.

rabble podcast network

The rabble podcast network continues to draw together the voices of people across Canada and the world who are working toward social justice. The podcast network does not whisper. It shouts.

Meagan Perry, Executive Producer, rabble podcast network

The rabble podcast network has always been at the forefront of covering issues that the mainstream media ignores. Last year was no exception, but the difference was that *rabble.ca* podcasters were setting the news agenda with our quick responses to stories like the Tahrir Square protests and Occupy Wall Street.

Our *rabble.ca* style, good reputation among social justice advocates and a decade of building connections at rabble made it possible for us to gather progressive viewpoints quickly, while the mainstream media struggled to keep up.

In 2011 we brought several new programs to the network including a podcast from Dr. Helen Caldicott on nuclear safety, *People's Health Radio* (a podcast focused on the social determinants of health), we launched an all new set of movie reviews with progressive views and a *Journalists for Human Rights* podcast which draws in material from JHR chapters across Canada.

This year, with the eye of the mainstream media very much focused on activism, the rabble podcast network was able to offer a wide variety of podcasts that helped to create a more nuanced view of activism, what it can accomplish and how it is happening worldwide.

As well, we presented several podcasts that grew out of specific events, including coverage of COP 17 via a podcast from the Canadian Youth Delegation to that event, and, as we have for several years in a row now, we produced a series of lectures recorded at the Congress of the Humanities.

2012 will be the year where we bring other parts of the site into the podcast network. We've begun with a new podcast featuring the issues and tools identified from the Activist Toolkit. The first episode was launched in early January, and features discussions around sex work issues, and an online tool that offers resources and techniques for sex workers who want to create a safer stroll.

Likewise, the radio book lounge is featuring audio interviews with authors and is the first host of a new program for in cahoots members.

July: <u>Introducing the next eco warriors</u> review by Derrick O'Keefe

O'Keefe passionately sides with Emily Hunter and the collection of short stories she has assembled in *The Next Eco Warriors: 22 Young Women and Men Who are Saving the Planet*, with the notion that hope is not a distant dream and this generation of environmental activists can create an opportunity for a stronger and more inclusive global environmental movement.

August: How to organize and stay sane review by Sonia Edworthy

Edworthy champions Come Hell or High Water: A Handbook on Collective Process Gone Awry by Delfina Vannucci and Richard Singer as a necessary critical analysis of the egalitarian collective process because it provides refreshing clarifications, critiques

and deconstructions of this process for those already immersed in it.

September: Remembering Chile's 9/11 review by Noreen Mae Ritsema

Ritsema relates the courage and bravery of

Carmen Aguirre expressed in memoir Something Fierce: Memoirs of a Revolutionary Daughter, a story of both Aguirre's personal involvement in the Chilean resistance movement from the age of 11 and Chilean history, which Aguirre insists is an important part of Canadian history because of the Canadian involvement in the resistance.

October: <u>Lynn Coady tackles the male psyche in 'The Antagonist'</u>

Moore imagines visions of Oscar Wilde and business executives' luncheons during his review of *The Antagonis*t by Lynn Coady, a revealing dissection of the male psyche nestled in cultural stereotypes and male entitlement.

November: How to say 'yes' to shamefree sex

Chiu takes an honest look at Jaclyn Friedman's What You Really Really Want: The Smart Girl's Shame-Free Guide to Sex and Safety, revealing that the interactive guide's dismantling of insidious ideas about sex and dating is not only possible, but fun and transformative.

December: <u>Fearmonger</u> and <u>Through</u> <u>the Glass</u>: <u>Books that undermine</u> <u>Harper's omnibus crime bill</u>

Behrens compares two drastically different books and their outlooks on the Harper Government's omnibus crime bill -- Through the Glass by Shannon Moroney and Fearmonger: Stephen Harper's Tough on Crime Agenda by Paula Mallea. Moroney champions a need for support for those in the system to address the root causes of their crimes, but also for the families left behind by the court system. Mallea's indepth analysis dissects each of the crime agenda's proposals based on her own extensive background in criminal law, expert voices and common sense arguments to conclude that punishment for punishment's sake will only result in costly billions and a less safe society.







Financial reflections


The total operating budget for rabble in 2011 was \$266,000.

rabble's reliance on Sustaining Partner income was represented in 61 per cent of our total income. Membership support accounted for 17 per cent of the annual budget, donations were up to 17 per cent and advertising sales and services accounted for only four per cent.

78 per cent of rabble's expenses are staffing and contributor costs. Within that staffing expense, 56 per cent is attributed to editorial costs, 29 per cent to fundraising and administration and 15 per cent to technical support.

Measuring website traffic


rabble uses AWStats and Google Analytics to measure website traffic. While the programs measure different variables (log files vs. javascript), together they provide a helpful view of traffic trends.

Both analytics programs continue to improve on the robustness of their measurements. In particular, AWStats' metrics improved to reduce the presence of non-human driven traffic on the site (search bots, etc). As a result, the real numbers in AWStats reports are reduced from previous years, however the trends continue to reflect a similar story to the measures provided in Google Analytics.

rabble had an average of 156,000 unique visitors per month, an average of 277,000 visits per month, and about 2 million page views per month. The website reached a high of 315,000 unique visitors during the 2011 federal election.

What is the difference between unique visitors and visits? In simple terms, unique visitors refer to the number of IP addresses, or individual computers, that visited the site over a period of time. The number of visits¹ represents the number of individual sessions initiated by all the visitors. From a Google Analytics standpoint, visits are the most basic measure of how effectively a site is performing.


The average time spent on the site in 2010 was 3.29 minutes per visit.




The above graphic, drawn from AWStats, is an indication of the traffic trends over the seasons of 2011.

¹ Visits represent the number of individual sessions initiated by all the visitors to your site. If a user is inactive on your site for 30 minutes or more, any future activity will be attributed to a new session. Users that leave your site and return within 30 minutes will be counted as part of the original session.

The initial session by a user during any given date range is considered to be an additional *visit* and an additional *visitor*. Any future sessions from the same user during the selected time period are counted as additional *visits*, but not as additional *visitors*.



In 2011 *rabble.ca* had 3,318,000 visits from 219 countries/territories. 82 per cent of traffic to the site came from Canada.



The above graphics indicate the primary methods by which people come to *rabble.ca*. In a switch this year, more than 40 per cent of traffic to the site came from Google, while nearly 28 per cent of the traffic came directly to the site. rabble's top referrer in 2011 was Google, with Facebook, Feedburner, StumbledUpon and Twitter among the top 10 referrers.

rabble operates with a small part-time staff and volunteer staff, and our work is supported by interns, volunteers and a volunteer board of directors.
