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LETTER FROM THE EDITORS

We could say 2023 was a historic year for rabble – but that would be an understatement.

To begin, after 18 years as rabble’s publisher, we said farewell to Kim Elliott. Kim, who had joined rabble in 2004 in the role of managing editor, took on the role as publisher in 2005 and fundamentally transformed rabble’s place in online news media as we knew it. As publisher, she led the charge on rabble’s status as not-for-profit, coordinated our first Board of Directors, and led the hiring and organizing of our small but mighty team throughout the years. Whether on the editorial or organizational side of rabble – for which she wore many hats on both – Kim’s dedication to rabble and accessible, progressive news in Canada never wavered. After almost 20 years, we officially bid Kim adieu in October 2023.

In July 2023, a little thing called Bill C-18 came into effect. Heard of it? As a completely digital news space, Bill C-18 (the Online News Act) had a huge impact on our audience engagement on Facebook, Instagram and Google. (To learn more about this, please see the “News in the 2020s” section of this report.)

With tech giants Meta and Google preventing us from gaining our regular traffic, rabble was already in a hard spot. Then, in the fall of 2023, rabble became flooded with a plethora of financial issues (read more about this in the “Financial reflections” section of this report). Because of these unexpected financial woes, we needed to make some extremely hard decisions.

Thankfully, with the support of our loyal readers and donors, the dedication of our board and staff, and the generosity of our sustaining partners, we were able to enter 2024 with a stronger financial plan and the inspiration to carry forward.

Throughout this report, we hope you’ll come to recognize the many heroes and organizations who helped keep us up-and-running through what ended up being a very big year for rabble.

In the newsroom, our staff kept you up-to-date on some of the biggest news stories in 2023. This included: a summer of record-breaking wildfires; a rise in 2SLGBTQIA+ hate and national push back; #SearchtheLandfill and the fight for justice for MMIWG2S; national union and labour action; and freedom for Palestine.

And we couldn’t have done it without our supporters. If we’ve said it once, we’ve said it a million times, but our rabble rousers truly are our lifeblood.

We are so grateful to everyone who pitched in in 2023 and proved to us that what we do matters. In 2024 and beyond, we’re committed to sharing news for the rest of us. And it’s thanks to you.

INDIGENOUS ISSUES

Indigenous coverage continues to remain a staple for rabble.

Through our columnists and news coverage, rabble continues to focus on Indigenous issues; whether they be environmental justice, political victories or the ongoing effort to address and reconcile Canada's colonial nature.

In 2023, this included the coverage of:

- Manitoba NDP leader Wab Kinew was elected as premier of that province, **becoming the first First Nations premier in Canada's history**
- The controversial removal of **RoseAnne Archibald as National Chief of the Assembly of First Nations**
- **Ongoing efforts** for truth and reconciliation
- The success of a motion for a national **Red Dress Alert system**
- Ongoing **environmental discrimination** against the Indigenous people of Grassy Narrows
- The fight to have a **Winnipeg area landfill searched** for the bodies of murdered Indigenous women

As a progressive news outlet, we here at rabble.ca know that a part of our duty is to continue to share Indigenous stories and to provide a platform for Indigenous speakers including **Erin Blondeau**, **Clayton Thomas-Muller** and others.

In 2024, rabble will continue to follow the story of truth and reconciliation and the triumphs of the Indigenous peoples of Canada.

CANADIAN POLITICS IN 2023

PARLIAMENTARY REPORTING

As a part of rabble's national focus, rabble maintains robust coverage of politics at the federal level. rabble parliamentary reporter Karl Nerenberg has long been at the forefront of that coverage.

Some highlights of Nerenberg's work in 2023 include his coverage on how the federal government tried to regulate the **tech industry**, how the House of Commons reacted to **allegations of an assassination** in Canada by India, and the turmoil caused by the former **Speaker of the House**.

PROVINCIAL POLITICS

Keeping an eye on provincial politics, rabble reporters **Scott Martin**, **Stephen Wentzell**, **Georgia Kelly** and editor **Nick Seebruch** kept rabble up-to-date on the stories of national significance from coast to coast to coast.

This included:

- **Rise of anti-trans legislation** at the provincial level
- The **election of Olivia Chow** as Mayor of Toronto
- A year of **historic wildfires**
- Calls to **search a Winnipeg landfill** for murdered Indigenous women

OFF THE HILL

rabble's coverage of Parliament is also found on our monthly political web panel Off the Hill. Off the Hill is a chance for MPs, activists and experts to come together to discuss pressing national political issues.

Some of the guests on our monthly panel series in 2023 included El Jones, NDP MP Charlie Angus, Tanya Burkart of ACORN Canada and more.

Our panel discussions included:

- Summer of fire – what's Ottawa got to do with it?
- Media accountability and covering Gaza
- What to do about our affordable housing crisis

To help maintain our connections to the labour movement, rabble was reporting on site during the **2023 Canadian Labour Congress convention** in Montreal.

JACK LAYTON JOURNALISM FOR CHANGE FELLOWSHIP

In partnership with the Institute for Change Leaders and the Douglas Coldwell Layton Foundation, *rabble.ca* presents the Jack Layton Journalism for Change Fellowship.

This fellowship supports emerging journalists who are passionate and engaged in developing unique voices in social change reporting by providing them a \$5,000 stipend for their work with *rabble* over a three-month period. The fellows' work at *rabble* is a combination of news reporting and feature writing.



In December 2023, Madison Edward-Wright was named the 2023/24 Journalism for Change Fellow.

Madison Edward-Wright (she/her) is a journalist based in Montreal, QC. She discovered her love for journalism while completing her undergraduate degree at McGill University. Before *rabble.ca*, her work had appeared in The Tribune and had written work for Briarpatch Magazine's March/April 2024 issue.

During her time as our Journalism for Change fellow, Edward-Wright exercised her passion for social justice by reporting on labour issues such as the Front commun's fight for **better working conditions and salaries** for teachers and healthcare workers in Quebec, on stories about the ongoing efforts in Canada to show **support for Palestine** and much more.

And after an exciting four months with Madison Edward-Wright as our 2023/24 Jack Layton Journalism for Change fellow, her fellowship has come to an end.

NEEDS NO INTRODUCTION

Needs No Introduction is rabble's space to share full speeches, lectures, and special interviews from some of the finest minds of our time.

Needs No Introduction is also the home of our 'Courage My Friends' podcast series. *Courage My Friends* is a partnership between the Tommy Douglas Institute at George Brown College and with the support of the Douglas Coldwell Layton Foundation. This series explores the intersections between climate change, capitalism and health care for Canadians.

NEWS IN THE 2020s

2023 threw a lot of curveballs at news institutions in Canada tracking their site users.

To start, Google Analytics retired its Universal Analytics product that has provided a consistent interface and measuring criteria for website managers, and forced people onto its GA4 platform. Because of this, the year-over-year comparison numbers should be taken with a grain of salt.

However, what is clear is that Meta's removal of news links from its platforms in Canada has had an impact. *rabble.ca* could count at least 200,000 visitors from such links in 2022, and the organization is down by a similar number overall. Still, *rabble.ca* counted some 620,000 users who had 919,000 sessions in total (down from 878,000 users and 1,270,000 sessions in 2022).

Also, the organization is in a better position than ever to turn as many of our regular readers into supporters, thanks to the completion of Google's Digital Foundations Lab training program we completed in June 2023. On the fundraising front, *rabble.ca* began streamlining placement of buttons, kinds of forms, styles in email asks and more after a/b tests and group discussions that continued after the bootcamp wound down.

We also gave the website a metadata overhaul, thanks to Google contractors who had a look at best practices and small things we can tweak under the hood to ensure people searching for content will easily find us on the search engine. Having adjusted to these changes the organization is in a great position to continue honing in on those sources for traffic that will help make up the difference for growth and contributions, and encourage readers onto platforms we'll keep control of forever like our newsletter.



NEWS FOR THE REST OF US, IN YOUR INBOX

2023 presented a unique challenge for *rabble.ca* with the implementation of Bill C-18. Recognizing how this would impact our social media reach, we swiftly pivoted strategies to ensure our progressive news and analysis continued to find its audience. While platforms like Instagram saw pauses in many features affecting rabble's readership through the platform, we focused on building engagement elsewhere. Here's what we achieved:

- Our email newsletter received a higher level of focus: In this evolving media ecosystem, direct communication grew even more valuable. Our newsletter sign-ups surged, demonstrating the public's desire for the unfiltered perspectives we offer.
- LinkedIn, and Twitter: We increased our presence on these platforms; LinkedIn impressions soared to over 15,500 and 'engagement' tracking exceeded 6,500. Twitter impressions maintained a strong level, reaching over 1.3 million throughout the year.

The growth in newsletter subscriptions and the sustained engagement across different platforms highlights how loyal readership remains – and how valuable rabble is to new audiences.

rabble.ca embodies resilience and commitment to independent journalism. While social media algorithms may shift, our mission does not. We will continue to innovate and find new channels and mediums of expression to ensure our stories reach our current and new audiences.

FINANCIAL REFLECTIONS:

NON PROFIT, COMMUNITY-SUPPORTED JOURNALISM

In 2023, *rabble.ca* was hit hard.

In October, rabble became flooded with a plethora of financial issues. Several grant and funding opportunities did not come through for us as we had expected, and that, coupled with our hefty CEBA loan from the COVID-19 pandemic, left us in a deep deficit.

We had to make extremely difficult decisions in 2023; temporarily laying off staff members, scaling back paid content from our columnists and contributors, and rethinking many of our processes in order to stay afloat.

Thankfully, with the support of our loyal readers and supporters, the dedication of our board and staff, and the generosity of our sustaining partners, we were able to enter 2024 with a stronger financial plan and the inspiration to carry on.

In 2023, a total of \$59,704 was raised by individual donors who donated one time – and a total of \$92,322 was raised from our recurring monthly donors.

Our sustaining partners, too, went above and beyond with their support. (Learn more about our sustaining partners in the “Sustaining Partners” section of this report.)

As a registered non-profit organization (non-charitable), we have always relied on our sustaining partners and supporting donors for their financial support; but in 2023, we learned that our donors and supporters truly rely on us too. We were reminded that the work we do in making progressive media accessible matters. For us, 2023 was a humbling and transformative year.

In addition to our donors and sustaining partners, we’d like to thank the Canadian Periodical Fund and Canadian Heritage for their support and the grants they offered us. We owe thanks as well to TechNation and Canada Summer Jobs for allowing us to hire editors, writers and digital engagement support this year.

We also want to thank the Institute for Change Leaders and the Douglas Coldwell Layton Foundation for their continuous, generous support of our Jack Layton Journalism for Change Fellowship. Without their support, our fellowship could not happen.
